Notice for Course Organisers

During its meeting held on 17.1.2011, the CWC committee decided to bring to your attention certain rules of the CERN Women's Club, concerning the number of participants in the courses we organise.

- 1. Indoor sports: the maximum number of **15 participants** must not be exceeded.
- 2. Language courses: class size is limited to **12 participants**.
- 3. A minimum number of **6 inscriptions** is required for a course to be held.
- 4. In any given course, the proportion of associate members participating cannot exceed **50% of the total** number of participants.
- 5. For outdoor sports groups (cross-country skiing and walking), a given person may be invited once or twice in the year to join in the group's activities. For a more frequent participation the person must become a member of the CWC.



Spotlight on the.... Oil Painting & Plastic Arts Class

riday mornings are a busy time at the CWC. We have a meeting of the Toddler Group; Sendy Duplay's French conversation classes meet in mezzanine; Intermediate and advanced Spanish classes are bv Alicia Bravo taught Garrote in the language room: there is Keep Fit Gymnastics with the instructor Vanina Gilomen in the gym; and the Oil Painting and Plastic Arts class, taught by Maria Luisa Godoy in the main club room.



The cernoises who attend this last class are no doubt the most identifiable. They come from the parking lot laden their paraphernalia: with carrying canvasses, easels, shopping bags, trolleys and even suitcases on wheels their painting containing materials. Clearly this takes dedication (and a certain amount of muscle!). Even on days with heavy snowfall a large proportion of students brave the conditions and faithfully attend. What makes these women so committed to the class and this activity?

According to student **Marie-Christiane Bouzod**, the benefits extend beyond the educational element of the class:



"This is like a kind of therapy, not only in the form of artistic expression, but also between us - the communication and support we get from our friends in the class."

Martha Percival, another longtime attendee, agrees with the therapeutic aspect, "Being here, working together...it renews our spirit and refreshes our outlook".

The class is open to all skill and each student works at her own pace and from her own stage of expertise. artistic The teacher, Maria Luisa Godoy, works individually with each student as the need arises. offering practical help instruction.



Even experienced painters can benefit, as **Marie-France Baglin** explains:

According to Maria Luisa:

"The most important thing in this group is that it enables one to allocate time to being creative and artistic. One must work to enter another dimension; that is the dimension where one can find creativity and the means to express it. This is something that comes not only from the world around us, but also from deep inside us.

Our modern lives are very busy, these days one is pushed and pulled in all directions. It is important to find the time...to figuratively "get away" - to go to a place where one can explore feelings and ideas. It's only 3 hours and in fact it passes very quickly but it gives the students time to think, to prepare; for their ideas to ferment and come to fruition...We thank the CERN Women's Club for this opportunity."

So - are you encouraged to discover your "inner da Vinci"? Then come and enjoy a creative interlude in the warm and friendly atmosphere of the Oil Painting and Plastic Arts class.

MARIA LUISA GODOY



A native of Spain, Maria Luisa received her training in Madrid where she studied design and painting. She moved to France in 1980, and settled in the Pays de Gex in 1983. She has been teaching art since 1992 and began the CWC class in 2002. In addition to teaching, she also exhibits her art regularly in the area.

Like many artists, she is socially conscious and her vision and themes resonate with the responsibility of the artist:

"In my view, the artist has a role in the world, by his creation, through his work; he is a witness to society. To denounce every attack on human dignity, on the rights of mankind, to rebel against the problems of our time, that ...shows that the artist has a part - through reflection and communication – in making a better world."

She recently exhibited a series of paintings around the theme "Ecocide", in which she explores the environmental damage affecting our planet. Beautiful and vibrant, these paintings strongly project the fragility and transience of the natural world. Details from "Ecocide II" and "Ecocide III" are reproduced below.

FOLLOW THE CANCER AWARENESS TRAIL: AN ESCA ADVENTURE

A vineyard budding, a forest awakening, birds nesting: bring the family, experience springtime and learn about **ESCA** (English Speaking Cancer Association) by participating in its

Cancer Awareness Trail

on Sunday, May 1, 2011 - beginning at 10h at Webster University / Bellevue, Geneva.

Each of six guided walks—three for adults, three for children—takes about an hour and a half and will be led by professionals who are knowledgeable about the area's flora and fauna. The last walks of the day will begin at 14h and end by16h.

Along the way adult walkers will encounter questions about cancer, nutrition, exercise and botany in a quiz designed to encourage discussion as much as to give information. Those who would prefer an unguided walk can follow a marked independent trail.

In addition to following nature trails, ESCA is looking into offering instruction in Nordic Walking, including practice of the technique on a path, under the supervision of a physiotherapist trained in the field. Those looking for this more vigorous experience should bring their own sticks.

In specially designed walks, children, who will be divided according to age, will be introduced to entomology as they seek out insects to study in their natural habitats. Each one will receive a relevant book, covered by the registration fee.

While some participants follow trails outside the University, others can go indoors to experience various complementary therapies, such as foot reflexology and Indian head massage. A sample gymnastics class will be available or visitors can explore areas from nutrition to "Look Good, Feel Good" at information stands.

A light lunch will be available at a nominal fee from 13h to 14h, or participants can bring their own meals. Drinks will be available all day.

Because places will be limited, advance reservations are recommended on: info@cancersupport.ch. The registration fee is 10 CHF.

Good tennis shoes and emergency rain gear are recommended attire since no event will be cancelled because of weather. In order to preserve the peace of the animal habitats along the trail, no pets can be allowed.


